Temporary Traffic Pattern Changes Scheduled March 14 to Continue Concrete Rehabilitation Work on U.S. 1

ST. AUGUSTINE, Fla. – As part of the Florida Department of Transportation's resurfacing and concrete rehabilitation project on U.S. 1 (State Road 5) from State Road 207 to the St. Augustine City Gates, U.S. 1 street entrances from U.S. 1 to Lemon Street, Saragossa Street, and the alley just north of Saragossa Street will be temporarily closed Monday, March 14 through Monday, March 21. The street closures are necessary to safely complete concrete rehabilitation work on U.S. 1.

Drivers will detour via Riberia Street to Orange Street (map 1).

Monday, March 21 through Monday, April 4, northbound travel lanes of U.S. 1 from Malaga Street to W. Castillo Drive (map 2) will be shifted for crews to safely complete concrete work between the two northbound travel lanes.

Kiewit Infrastructure South Company is estimated to complete the \$15 million improvements by late summer 2023, weather and unforeseen circumstances permitting.

March is bicycle safety month. When cycling always wear a helmet and ride in the same direction of traffic on the street. Obey all traffic signs, signals, and markings.
